Session 4: Mutual recognition

Julius, A.J.; "Mutual recognition".
Aristotle, *Nicomachean Ethics*, IX:9.

When I act for the reasons I'm given by the fact that you have reasons, I act toward you in a way that presupposes your own capacity and responsibility for doing a version of what I'm doing—for doing what presupposes that I can and should do my version. We'll consider this as an example of mutual recognition, and we'll discuss such other instances of the syndrome as conversation and friendship.

Session 5: Producing as humans

Marx, K.: "Notes on James Mill" and excerpts from the 1844 manuscripts.
Julius, A.J.: "Suppose we had produced as human beings".

We'll examine Marx's account of self-conscious human production activity as a form of mutual recognition and his claim that, in producing for exchange and subject to property, people are failing to work together but beginning to discover that we can.

Julius, A.J.: *Reconstruction*, chapter 15.

Propertyless workers act for the first time freely when they first act to free themselves from property. That's the moment at which human productive cooperation becomes self-conscious. Or so Marx imagines. We'll take another look.
